
How do Masterpoints work?

On club nights, you are awarded C points when you win, or do well. When you get 100 C points, they convert to 1 x B points. B points do not convert to A points – you win A points in selected tournaments.

To become a Grand Master, you need at least 1000 A + B Masterpoints, of which at least 500 must be A points. Every year on 1st January, older A and B points are discounted by 20% to give more relevance to those points earned more recently.


Carol Moore recently exhibited her Nigerian Dwarf dairy goats at the Kumeu A & P Show. Neil
