Upcoming Ultra Restricted Tournament Series

We have an exciting tournament coming up aimed at our most junior-ranked players.

Officially titled "Junior and Novice or Certificate of Proficiency Rank" players, not all Junior players qualify.

We will combine with Papakura, Papatoetoe and Howick Bridge Clubs in a four week series, to be played on four consecutive Sundays. Players can play in 1, 2, 3 or all 4 sessions, and there will be a trophy which will be awarded to the best pair who play in a minimum of 3 sessions with the same partner. The trophy will be kept at the club to which the winning pair belong.

The first session will be this coming Sunday at Papakura Bridge Club, starting at 1pm, so those playing please be there by 12:30pm and seated by 12:45pm.

Our "leg" of the tournament is the following Sunday 21st July - Jim Buckland will direct, Jonathan Taylor will score - and we have experienced helpers ready to assist with the bidding (each player has a joker card which they can use once to ask for help).

Player News – 3) other news


Although it doesn't seem like it, there are signs of spring about:

When we look at the websites of other clubs, we realise just how splendid ours is! A recent addition is "2024 Winners" on the home page of our website. Club Captain Terry Evans is listing the 2024 winners as each series is concluded, and prior to having the trophies engraved. Also included is a photo and a little history, as far as is known, of each trophy. These little histories were compiled several years ago by Chris Glyde.

Table Talk can add to the history of one of the trophies – the **Stembridge Cup** – awarded to the winner of the Monday Ladder, was donated in 1964 by Mrs Irene Stembridge. The Stembridge family owned Stembridge Transport, a prominent local trucking firm during the era when Pukekohe Hill was covered in market gardens.

Mrs Irene Stembridge was the great-aunt of our current player Dennise Biddick (Irene was married to Dennise's father's uncle). As well as playing bridge at Franklin for many years, Irene was also a good golfer and during World War II, was a nurse in Europe with the troops.

Paying table money online

During our recent survey, there were a few queries "Can we pay our \$6 table money online?".

The short answer is "no". We don't want dozens (possibly hundreds) of individual \$6 deposits on our bank statement, each requiring reconciling to the number of tables played, and sometimes follow-up reminders. Our Treasurer, like all our committee, is a volunteer, already committed in terms of time to table money, invoices for payment, wages and PAYE paid, accounting for tournaments, liaising with our chartered accountant, McConnell Stafford-Bush and Associates Ltd. (it's nice to see Stephen back at the bridge table recently).

Currently, our preferred method of payment is for members to purchase table money vouchers, and increasing numbers of members are doing this which is great news. \$30 for 5 nights, \$60 for 10 nights, payable in cash or by bank transfer. Please reference your payment "table money". Vouchers are available through Teresa Green, Maureen Nelson and Jim Buckland. Cash is, of course, also acceptable on the night.

Out and About in Franklin

Big alterations have started at Jessica's Restaurant, situated on the ground floor of the cinema complex in Edinburgh Street. The restaurant is being down-sized, and part of the ground floor will become the new lobby for the upstairs cinemas. Another cinema, with lazyboy chairs etc., will be built in the vacated upstairs lobby, so Cinema 3 will become Cinema 4. Work is already under way, Jessica's will be closed for a month in September, and the new arrangement is expected to be up and running in October.

It's nice to have a fresh fish outlet in Pukekohe again. **Oceanz** have just opened a new shop on Stadium Drive, in the group of shops which includes Baker's Delight and the Mad Butcher. At the moment, they are selling fresh and frozen fish, but are looking to add a fish and chip option at a later date. The installation of traffic lights at the intersection there is still incomplete, the road cones and diversions causing more than the usual holdups there.

The traffic lights at the Bombay motorway intersection have been started, although at the moment there isn't much to see. They were due to take "3-4 months" as of June, so they should be working about September/October.

And do you wonder how they're getting on with Pukekohe railway? At Easter, Kiwirail advised that they were on track to reopen in early 2025. Their newsletter read:

"Along this 19km section of the Southern Line, we have made significant improvements to the track, upgraded six public level crossings, installed all the masts and bridges that support the overhead electric lines and installed approximately 94% of the overhead electric lines.

At the Pukekohe Station, so far, the team have completed the track works, built two new sets of stairs, installed a new lift shaft and the platform canopies. We are now working on asphalting the platforms and installing the stair canopies, the tactile pavers, the staff facilities building and the external cladding of the platform building."
