Wednesday Teams started on 4<sup>th</sup> September. We have 14 teams this year, and 6 of this year's beginners put their names down to play. Special rules for them – a "joker" card which they can use once per night to get help with their bidding, and no penalty doubles! We're doing 3 x 7 boards per night, which allows a bit of extra time for the players. We want everyone to have a fun time.

As in previous years, each team is assigned a colour, and players are encouraged to wear their colours to play in. Originally, we had 52 players = 13 teams put their names down, but that made difficulties for scheduling, so Maureen Nelson is captaining a team of people who couldn't play all 4 nights – probably 7 different players on her team. They haven't got a specific colour, their team is called "Allsorts".

At the end of the first week, **YELLOW** team was winning, but after 2 weeks (6 matches) they have been overtaken by **SILVER**, with **PURPLE** now in second place, YELLOW are third.
