Out and About in Franklin

The **Te Huia Train** from Auckland to Hamilton is making fare changes, effective from 1st October. Superannuitants have in the past travelled free all day, this has now changed to full adult fares in peak times – defined as 6am to 9.30am and 3pm-6.30pm <u>weekdays</u>. Off-peak travel continues to be free with a gold card.

And if you're on grandparent duty these holidays (now), children aged 5-15 are now half price on Te Huia. You need a special travel card called a Bee Card to travel on Te Huia.
